CEO MESSAGE



Dear Friends,

Asian Health Services (AHS) has seen both great resilience and great need in 2019 through 2020. Our community was faced with challenges of COVID-19 that hit everyone on the national level, with the need for tests, protective gear to prevent transmission (Personal Protective Equipment, or PPE), and addressing the anxiety and isolation caused by the pandemic and shelter-in-place orders. Our AAPI community was and continues to be at a particular nexus of vulnerability as we are disproportionately affected by language barriers and escalating anti-Asian racism.

Throughout this time period, we have heard stories of courage, and also stark examples of vulnerable patients needing care and support. Our teams worked day and night to address clinical needs as well as the critical emotional and social service needs that are increasing by the day.

From the onset of COVID-19, our team began going at warp speed to protect our patients. As soon as AHS saw that COVID-19 testing rates were low in the AAPI community, we launched testing sites in Oakland Chinatown and in Fremont that provided free services in 12 Asian languages. The number of AAPI community members who received COVID-19 tests subsequently jumped drastically.

AHS is and has always been here for our community of more than 50,000 patients throughout Alameda County, providing health care, comfort, education, information, reassurance, problem-solving, and advocacy for all, in English and 14 different languages. Each and every one of us at Asian Health Services is committed to the future of our community's health. Without you, we could not have played such a critical role in providing timely multilingual and multicultural COVID-19 response efforts for our most vulnerable.

Upon Mr. Ocampo's arrival from the Philippines several years ago, he became a patient at Asian Health Services. He worked several jobs in order to care for his elderly parents.

As COVID-19 spread across the U.S. in 2020, Mr. Ocampo, a long-time patient who worked at a home care facility, was one of many vulnerable patients at AHS who was directly impacted by COVID-19. As soon as Mr. Ocampo began to recognize he was exhibiting symptoms of COVID-19, he immediately went to get tested at Asian Health Services' free COVID-19 testing site in Oakland, which provided testing in 12 Asian languages. After anxiously waiting for his results, he finally received a call informing him that he indeed tested positive for COVID-19. Worried about how he would quarantine and fearing for his elderly parents, he did not know what to do. The first thing he did was call Asian Health Services.

"When I tested positive for COVID-19, AHS was the first place I called because I didn't know what to do, especially because I have two fragile seniors who live in my house – my mother and father. Asian Health Services helped me find a place where I could quarantine. The AHS social worker helped me make sure I was not worried, anxious, or in fear."

From finding a place to quarantine to providing needed medical care, AHS social workers also ensured Mr. Ocampo's parents received food assistance while he was in quarantine. They also provided medical and social support to his parents until Mr. Ocampo was able to safely return home.
